Deer Pond Restoration Begins

A significant element of the Schuetzen Park will be rehabilitated this spring. The "Deer Pond", which was located just east of the Park's streetcar railway station, will be dredged out and replanted with native plant species. Working with a hydrology engineer from Shive-Hattery, the Schützenpark Gilde is undertaking this project in partnership with the Davenport Good Samaritan Center and with financial support from the Riverboat Development Authority, the Mary Iva Gittens Knouse Charitable Trust and the Iowa Dept. of Natural Resources. The re-creation of the pond will not only enhance the Park, it will also serve as a major retention area for the water that runs off of the parking lots from the Center and surrounding landscapes. The pond's original spillway, which is still intact and functioning, will once again provide an escape route for excess water from the pond, which eventually flows into Blackhawk Creek and then to the Mississippi. The Park's trail system will also be expanded to eventually include a route around the Deer Pond. With excavation set to begin soon, planting of

vegetation such as cat tails, snake grass, water lilies etc., will continue the months. into summer will Surrounding hillsides be planted with native woodland plants such as Dutchman's breeches, bleeding hearts, jack-in-the-pulpits. In time, aquatic creatures will return to populate the pond and someday the sounds of frogs croaking will again be heard in the Park.
